

Meet Champ!

Our biggest resident is also our most fascinating! Dive into Lake Champlain to meet everyone's favorite lake monster.

A Legendary Mystery

"Lake monster" sounds scary, but to us, this water-loving creature is a friendly, shy fellow who happily frolics in the deep waters of the lake. We're not afraid of him; we love him!

Named after the lake he lives in, people have been spotting Champ, or one of his relatives, since at least the 1600s. Because he's so hard to spot, it's impossible to know exactly what he is. The original dwellers of the area, the Abenaki and Mohawk, spoke of a huge serpent. Some say he's a gigantic gar or sturgeon while others compare him to

the long-extinct plesiosaur, an aquatic dinosaur with flippers and a long neck.

Celebrating the green monster

Champ is a star here and even if you don't spot him, you can join in the fun. Visit the selfie-friendly Champ statue in Port Henry, or really get into the swim of things by attending the annual Champ Day Festival!

If you see him, remember the principles of Leave No Trace: give him plenty of room to swim and do not disturb him. He was here first, after all. Try to get a photo though; we'd love to see it!

Jump on in

The Lake Champlain Region is full of opportunities to enjoy the water. The biggest, and most obvious, is Lake Champlain itself, but there are dozens of gorgeous drops of

water sprinkled around this incredible area. With more publicly accessible waterfront than anywhere else on the lake, there is sure to be a place for everyone to make a splash. Take in the views from the sandy beaches of Ticonderoga, Port Henry, Willsboro, and Westport. For a quieter setting, stroll through the charming picnic area of Lincoln Pond, or see one of the countless lakes, ponds, and rivers that interconnect this stunning region.

Get out there

You can't experience it all from the shore! The water bodies of the Lake Champlain Region are calling your name, and there's no better way to answer than to go see them yourself. There are plenty of ways to experience the grandeur of Lake Champlain and its surroundings — from leisurely cruises and tours to thrilling water adventures. Choose from dozens of access points across the region's vast waterfront. Many of the local marinas will be able to give you the info and gear you need to get out on the water yourself. Catch a glimpse of the Champlain Valley's open spaces from the water. Rent a



boat, take a cruise, or learn to sail on one of North America's largest freshwater lakes.

Not your oar-dinary paddle


From relaxing and scenic flatwater, to adventurous whitewater, the Lake Champlain Region has all types of paddlers covered. There is an incredible variety of paddling to be done in the Adirondacks. Sheltered bays make for calmer paddles while the open water offers a perspective of the unparalleled scope of the region. Seemingly endless lakes, ponds, and rivers weave throughout the region, interconnecting and forming limitless multi-day routes for paddling. Rent or bring your own kayak, canoe, or stand-up paddle board to explore backcountry Adirondack flatwater. For the more daring, take a guided tour down the rushing Ausable Chasm, or discover the long, uninterrupted stretches of river that make the Adirondacks so unique.

Year-round fishing fun

Reel in your own fishing story and get hooked on some of the best fishing around!

Fishing from a motorboat or kayak can get you right into the heart of the best fishing!

It's all about the bass

And trout. And walleye. And salmon. And pike. You get the picture. There are a lot of fish here! In fact, there are over 90 species of fish identified in the Lake Champlain Basin.

Hit the water

When the weather is warmer, the fishing is superb on Lake Champlain and surrounding bodies of water. Whether you're on a boat or fishing from shore or a pier, there is plenty to catch and fishing holes to visit. Even though the perch and sunfish are fun, the big bass (large

and smallmouth) fishing tournaments are exciting on a new level. Lake Champlain has been named one of the best bass fisheries in the nation! Rumor has it that bass between 15 and 20 pounds can be found south of the Champlain Bridge. If you feel like you're in uncharted waters, hire a local guide to help you find the deep holes where lake trout are known to hide. Fishing from a canoe or kayak is a popular pastime on quieter areas of Lake Champlain or any one of the smaller ponds in the area. Your next big catch is just a cast away!



their fingertips, so speaking with them can help get you on the ice faster and safer, and maybe help you land a monster salmon. The smaller lakes and ponds in the area are also great for ice fishing.

Don't get snagged

Being prepared to go fishing may not seem like the most romantic topic, but it's vital to maintain the integrity of the fishery! Some things you can do are: know the rules & regulations of the area, pack out all unused bait, avoid using lead sinkers and

jigs, discard fishing line in proper disposals, and clean all gear to be free and clear of any non-native aquatic invasive species. Did

you know that fishing line can take 500 years to decompose? Be sure to do your part to keep Lake Champlain and the surrounding waterbodies clean and healthy!

Here's a tip

In winter the fishing doesn't stop! Ice fishing is a beloved tradition. Conditions are obviously a bit different than in summer, so be sure to carefully study ice thickness and be prepared for a winter

Ride the pines

Take a ride through a conifer forest next to one of the country's oldest running attractions. The gentle trails at Ausable Chasm are great for the

beginner rider or anyone looking to get outside. Wellmarked routes weave between the trees, and the pine lined forest floor makes for a smooth ride. While the soft trail surface isn't as technically demanding as other areas, tight turns through the

trees help to create interesting trails. Ride the afternoon away. Then, spend the night at the Ausable Chasm campground right next door.

Champ's Tip!

Being a lake monster, I don't do much biking. But Barkeater Trails Alliance (BETA) has all the mountain biking trail info you could need!

Saddle up, get down!

Full of turns, berms, and good times, Otis Mountain offers some of the most difficult and engaging riding in the region. Once an old abandoned ski hill, this dirt merchant's paradise has quickly become a local favorite. These 600 acres are home to several summits, a waterfall, and the Otis Mountain Get Down music festival. Cruise along the lowlands, or take a trip to the top, tackling challenging climbs and a mix of natural and manmade features along the way.

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Cycling



Legendary road cycling

Take a ride through wide open spaces. Smooth, winding roads, rolling hills, and legendary views make the Lake Champlain Region a cyclist's paradise. These mountains and rolling fields offer the perfect backdrop for any ride!

Theme loops

Add some flair to your twowheeled journey. Themed loops like "Mountain-Coast Connector," "Acres of Apples," or "Fort to Fort" will give your adventures some direction.

There are dozens of themes and even more ways to enjoy them. Enjoy the ride for what it is, or put on your best miner costume and hit the "Iron to Iron" loop. Whether vou're wearing lycra or overalls, riding paved roads or gravel, these routes provide incredible views of this unique region. What are you waiting for? Get out and ride!

A full 360 of Lake Champlain

For those looking to expand their loop, why not bring it all the way around? Circumnavigate North America's 13th largest lake on this 360-mile scenic bike route. Coast along the edge of the water as you take in golden fields and distant mountains. Make your way by the Richelieu River of Québec, and look back at the Adirondacks as you pedal through Vermont.



Pedal the Empire State

From Battery Park in New York City, up to our neighbors to the north, the Empire State Cycling Trail runs its most scenic course through the heart of the Champlain Valley. This 750-mile bike

Winter Fun

A new season means new views to enjoy! When the leaves are gone and the snow falls, these open spaces get even bigger. This iconic view of Ausable Chasm changes with every season, but no matter what the weather, it's breathtaking!

Slide through history

The cross-country skiing here is legendary — literally. Ski through historic battlegrounds at Crown Point along the shores of Lake Champlain. Looking for more? Choose

from one of over 100 miles of the Champlain Area Trail System, or ski the rolling foothills of the craggy peaks surrounding Cobble Hill Golf Course in Elizabethtown. No matter the distance or difficulty you choose, these skis will make your trip unforgettable.

Be prepared

No need to sink with every step this winter. Strap up those snowshoes and hit the trails. Take in all the best views of distant peaks, snowy vistas, and the legendary Lake Champlain on the Champlain Area Trail System. Beginner snowshoers and winter hikers will find solace on low-lying trails through glimmering fields. Those more experienced in snow flotation and accustomed to winter hiking will enjoy the more challenging offerings like the Broughton Ledges loop.

Kick, stride, and glide

For an easy way to enjoy the chilly temperatures this winter, bundle up and take a lap around one of the many public ice rinks in the area. Bring your skates, and enjoy incredible views of the Champlain Valley.

All routes lead up

There are several ways to ascend the 2,170 foot Poke-O-Moonshine Mountain. Two hiking trails make for great snowshoe excursions: the "Observer's Trail" and its steeper counterpart the "Ranger Trail." Both lead to

the summit and a spectacular 360-degree view from the firetower that sits atop of it.

Besides its place as a former forest fire observation point, Poke-O-Moonshine has a lesser known, and more extreme, history. That legacy lies in the world of ice climbing. From this, Poke-O-Moonshine has become internationally recognized as the site of some challenging and historic climbing routes. Take on this hike and you're bound to see climbers testing themselves on this mile-long vertical band of rock and ice.

Champ's Tip!

Want to get these wide open spaces all to yourself? Winter is the perfect time to avoid the crowds. Take my advice, I've been avoiding crowds for years!

Cool CATS


Champlain Area Trails (CATS) is a local land trust that protects land, creates trails, and connects people with nature in the Champlain Valley. With over 150-miles of trails, CATS has defined hiking in the area. From mellow, familyfriendly walks in the woods to steeper mountains, there is a variety of terrain difficulty so that means there's a trail perfect for you! You don't have to hike far to get the big views: Coot Hill Trail/Big Hollow Trail offers a stunning vista with only a 0.5-mile hike. Belfry and Poke-O-Moonshine mountains are others with big views, but these two summits feature something unique - fire towers!

Split Rock Wild Forest

The largest undeveloped tract of land on the Lake Champlain shoreline, Split Rock Wild Forest has miles of moderately difficult trails and is home to a lot of wildlife!

Go with the flow

There is even hiking in town! The La Chute River Walk Trail is a local favorite for exploring



the natural and industrial milling history along the La Chute River in Ticonderoga.

Love Your ADK



Attractions new and old

Discover the history of the Champlain Valley. From historic forts to geological phenomena, these places are legendary.

The historic sites of the Lake Champlain Region are wide, varied, and all come with their fair share of incredible views.

Cross the pond

Crown Point State Historic Site is full of things to see. Take a photo of the iconic Lake Champlain Bridge, the historic memorial lighthouse, and His Majesty's legendary fort.

This huge area of Champlain coastline gives you lots of space to explore every angle of the lake, its attractions, and the looming mountains in the distance. Get up close, and check out the original Rodin sculpture mounted on the lighthouse. Walk through a fort built centuries ago, or take a stroll across the bridge and into Vermont. End the day fishing in the lake, and spend the night at the Crown Point campground, located near two historic sites.

A storied fort

The long and storied past of Fort Ticonderoga replays every day. With living history demonstrations, live reenactments, and events throughout the year, there are endless things to learn and see. The team at Fort Ticonderoga work their way through each period of the fort's story. From dramatic sieges, sabotage, and changes of power, to the mundane elements of everyday life on the lake, live actors are consistently immersing themselves in the era. They're also teaching you along the way! You'll be amazed by the incredible handmade garments, preserved artifacts,



and engaging presentations. Fort Ticonderoga is a mustsee in the Lake Champlain Region.

The Grand Canyon of the Adirondacks

A year-round destination, Ausable Chasm is the longest running natural attraction in the country. This spectacular gorge and its towering walls are often referred to as the "Grand Canyon of the Adirondacks," In the summer, float down the river or climb high above it on the adventure course. Guided hikes, climbs, and rafts are available for everyone. Come winter, the dazzling waterfalls turn to impressive ice formations. Experience the guiet of the Adirondack wilderness as you snowshoe along the chasm walls. The campground and trails located just behind the chasm are the perfect place to cap off your adventure. Mountain bike or ski, depending on the season, and replay the whole adventure in your tent that night!

Heritage / Museums



Explore our legendary heritage

In the Lake Champlain Region, history comes to life through museums, historic sites, and family-oriented heritage celebrations.

Our towns are rich in fascinating history, with historic homes and links to the nation's very beginnings. Are you ready to explore?

It's time to forget what you think history is all about. Textbooks? Not on this vacation! This is a place where museums tell a rich array of stories, of the people and places that made the area so unique. From suffragists to

iron miners, a famous pencil to the Underground Railroad, ours is an area with a complex, fascinating history all around.

Follow the north star

One of the brightest lights in the region's heritage is its role in the Underground Railroad. At the North Star Underground Railroad Museum near Keeseville and Ausable Chasm, this often sobering but beautiful and important story is told through innovative exhibits, tours, and special events. Learn how local residents helped fugitive slaves find freedom and new lives and the former slaves whose lives were transformed.

Finding home

If you've ever wondered how people lived in the past, the historic house museums in the region are brilliantly equipped to show you! Visit Ticonderoga's Hancock House, a stone replica of a Boston mansion, which features several floors of artifacts, exceptional 18th and 19th century American craftsmanship, and exhibits on local history including rural life, suffrage, and the Iroquois.

Just a few minutes away, the Penfield Homestead Museum is an expansive space with several 18th century buildings that tell the story of rural life. From the homestead itself to the carriage barn and church, you'll feel as though you've traveled back in time.

Mountains of iron

Today, the region is lush with forests, waterfalls, and scenic overlooks, but there was a time when the area resounded with the sound of mining. Land rich in iron and other minerals is all around us and the mining industry flourished for over 100 years, shaping and defining many towns. Dig into that history at Port Henry's Iron Center Museum, or visit the Ticonderoga


Heritage Museum, where graphite mining and the story of the famous Ticonderoga pencil is told!

For a museum that brings together many of the historic threads of the area, don't miss the wide-ranging exhibits at the Adirondack History Museum in Elizabethtown. It even has a fire tower from a mountain summit!

If your idea of a vacation involves putters, the sweet sound of irons striking golf balls, and an Arnold Palmer at the end of a rewarding day on the fairways, then do we have golf courses for you! In the Lake Champlain Region, verdant courses offer up close and personal views of Adirondack mountains and forest preserves close to sparkling Lake Champlain.

In historic Westport, home of the Depot Theatre, historic buildings, and excellent lakeside dining, Westport Golf is a historic course with challenges that can be suited to beginners or long-time golfers. Created by Scottish course architect Tom Winton, the course is eye-catching and attention-grabbing, with just the right amount of intimidation to bring out the best in your game.

A short drive (in the car) down Route 9N/22 will bring you to the Ticonderoga Golf Course, where mountain views will leave you breathless. You'll need to pay attention, though, because this hilly course, designed by golf legend Seymour Dunn in 1926, offers an exhilarating challenge. Don't miss dining at Seymour's, the club restaurant.

Inspiration abounds

The natural world and outdoor activities shine in the Lake Champlain Region, but it isn't all big outdoors here. A variety of cultural events and lively entertainment adds a unique element to the region that helps create a distinctive

atmosphere that combines a little bit of everything. Throughout all four seasons, there is a wide array of artistic offerings, celebrations, and festivals on the Adirondack Coast of Lake Champlain. With so much to do, you better get your calendar out now and start planning for the year!

Legendary events

Enjoy a multitude of events in the Lake Champlain Region, where annual events are always memorable and unique! In summer, the Essex County Fair brings rides and games, as well as events and exhibits which honor the history of agriculture in the area. In fall, the Adirondack Harvest Festival showcases the many farms and flavors of the Champlain Valley. Of course, throughout the year, other events pop up, featuring holiday celebrations, outdoor sports, and creative endeavors. Don't miss the Whallonsburg Grange Hall, built in 1915, which has been restored and reclaimed as a vibrant year-round community center for music, movies, theater, lectures, classes and family events.



Art everywhere

With so much natural beauty, it's not hard to understand why so many artists chose to showcase their works in the Lake Champlain Region. In Port Henry, a walking tour leads visitors to 18 murals around the historic hamlet. From Crown Point to Keeseville, there are artists everywhere! One place where art really speaks is Ticonderoga Arts (or Ti Arts), which is a lovely establishment that ties art and community together.

Sing and dance

In Westport, the Depot Theatre transformed an old train station into a professional theatre, inviting visitors to "take a journey without leaving the station." In Lewis, Meadowmount School of Music has helped many students achieve their musical career goals for over 75 years. Artistic expression is not lost in the natural beauty of the region. Visitors and locals alike can catch a program at the Depot Theatre or Meadowmount in summer.

Birding



A bird a day...

Four seasons of birding means plenty of opportunity to find migrants and year-round resident birds.

From Caspian Terns (above) to Snow Buntings (right), the birds here are as legendary as the landscape!

Seasons of change

The Champlain Valley and Lake Champlain Region offer excellent year-round birding. Each season offers different bird species, creating an exciting environment for expert birders and beginners alike. From the singing warblers of spring and summer to the hardy ducks that winter on open waters, the variety and diversity of species is nothing short of incredible. Lake Champlain is along the Atlantic Flyway, so it is a premier destination for birders spring, summer, fall, and winter!

Spring: A new beginning

Spring makes its way to the Champlain Valley a little sooner than most of the Adirondacks, welcoming back early migrants like Common Grackles, Song Sparrows, and Red-winged Blackbirds. Birds of all shapes and sizes move along the spine of the lake during their travels north. Crown Point State Historic Site is a great location to see the birds and hear the chorus. Warblers of all varieties also begin to arrive during this time. Their colorful

plumage and songs add a lot

of excitement to the forests.



Summer can mean a quiet time as birds settle into their nests and begin to raise young, but still, Ospreys and Caspian Terns can be seen gliding above the lake. Keep eyes and ears open

for shorebirds and early warblers, who might start their southward migration in mid-to-late August, and for Bobolinks and Savannah Sparrows in open fields.



When the winds cool a bit, many of the region's birds start to head south. Canada and Snow Geese gather in large groups, and even some rarities mix in. Songbirds will also be on the move in their non-breeding

plumage, but that just adds to the excitement. Raptors also migrate this time of year, and Coon Mountain is a great vantage point to see them soaring in the valley below.

Winter: Duck season

The woods quiet down and a lot of the birding action takes place along the lakeshore in winter. When there is open water, thousands he form large mixed

of ducks form large mixed species rafts. Common Goldeneye and Greater & Lesser Scaup are frequently seen. Away from the lake, Snow Buntings and Horned Larks fill fields with playful chatter.

From lake to sea

Recognized as the lowest point in the entire 6-million-acre Adirondack Park, Lake Champlain is home to 587 miles of shoreline, 70+ islands, and roughly 6.8 trillion gallons

of water. With access to the St. Lawrence and Hudson Rivers, every boat launch on Lake Champlain is interconnected with the rest of the world via the Atlantic Ocean. The lake's extremes measure 12 miles across, and 120 miles long! All together, this makes for 435 square miles of water on the surface of this fascinating lake.

Mysteries of the deep

Discover some of Lake Champlain's spookiest secrets! At its deepest, Lake Champlain reaches around 400 feet below the surface. The dark and murky bottom is home to as many as 300 shipwrecks, old and new. Dive down and discover them yourself, or take a shipwreck tour on the water with the Lake Champlain Maritime Museum. Once there, a remote camera will dive down to the site of the wreck, giving you live images of what lies beneath.

Ancient history

Lake Champlain is home to the oldest known fossil reef in the world. Around 450 million years ago, these chunks of ancient sea bed were cemented in time.



Along with the seafloor, the remains of 400-million-year-old aquatic life are preserved in the freestanding pillars of limestone. However, not every species left their mark here. The fabled lake monster, Champ, still swims and plays in the depths of North America's 13th largest lake. Think you can find him?

A fishy situation


There are over 90 identifiable aquatic species in Lake

360° history of the Adirondacks

From forest fire prevention to presentday exploration.

Fire on the mountain

In the early 1900s, huge forest fires swept through the Adirondacks. New York state began to implement a fire observation station program, with fire towers and observers, as an early fire detection effort. Two fire towers in the Lake Champlain Region played an enormous role in forest fire prevention: Poke-O-Moonshine Mountain and Belfry Mountain Fire Observation Stations. As active fire observation stations, Poke-O-Moonshine and Belfry worked with other fire towers and observers in the area to locate forest fires and send crews to extinguish the flames. Today, visitors can hike either of these mountains to take in the incredible 360° from the fire towers and appreciate the land protected by fire tower observers.

Wondering where the name Poke-O-Moonshine comes from? Well, it's believed to be a deviation from the Algonquin words "pohqui" (meaning "broken") and "moosie" (meaning "smooth"). Distant views of the mountain will shed light on the broken and smooth characteristics, as the mountain rises up above Interstate-87 with jagged cliffs but somehow still appears smooth. The origin of the name "Belfry" is not as clear, but it's likely a warping of the last name of someone who lived in the area.
